PE and Sport Premium introduction

The Department for Education (DfE) has stated that the PE and sport premium must be used to fund additional and sustainable improvements to the provision of PE and sport, for the benefit of primary-aged pupils, in the 2022 to 2023 academic year, to encourage the development of healthy, active lifestyles.

The PE and Sport Premium is allocated to schools to enable them to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of PE and sport they offer. Springfield School offers a range of PE and Sporting activities that are relevant to the physical and social abilities of all the pupils and exceed the minimum requirement. The following outlines how the funding of £16,640 and the carry forward of £460 (total £17,100) was used in 2022-2023 and the impact for pupils at the school. This document also signposts where evidence of the impact can be found.

Swimming competency

The Year 6 pupils have a range of profound and complex learning difficulties. They do not yet meet the national curriculum requirements however, information is collated regarding capabilities and individual achievements relative to their specific needs and starting points. Their individual targets, where appropriate, build towards the competency skills including a self-rescue.
